### FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

### <u>ADAR</u>

Jews seem to have a knack for complicating things. Actually, it is the natural result of looking at things deeply. From that perspective, something fascinating emerges from the two ways we count time.

Tishrei is the month that marks the creation of mankind. For us mortal beings, this is the central event of human history. Thus, Tishrei is the first month. G-d however sees things from a different angle. As expressed by His Torah, the emergence of the Jewish nation is the beginning of meaningful history. Thus, Nissan is the first month.

Which brings us to Adar, the month of Purim, the month that directly precedes Nissan. From the Torah's perspective, Adar is the last month of the Hebrew calendar. Adar is often described as the "month of darkness," because during Haman's time we were closer than ever to suffering total annihilation. The light of Nissan, the light of liberation, could have been extinguished, had Haman's plot succeeded. Through the miracle of Purim, the darkness turned to light.

Adar is the Jewish month of good fortune. In fact, Purim is the most joyful time of the entire year. "When Adar arrives, we increase our joy," say the Sages.

One might expect the Megillah to be replete with descriptions of the miracle of Haman's defeat, giving credit to the Author of all miracles. Yet what we find is very different. G-d's name is not mentioned even once in the entire narrative. The Megillah is a great dichotomy, where the Hero is always off stage, but yet the most central figure of the entire drama.

The Jewish view is to see that chaos and order in fact do co-exist, and that each one has a purpose. We are meant to meet the challenges presented by life's hard side, and to find inspiration in the beauty and joy that we see just as readily when our eyes are open. Every so often G-d opens the gates wide enough to give us a message that can sustain us when things seem hopeless. The message is: "I am here now, as I have been all along, and I will always be here for you. Not just when the sea splits, or when My presence overwhelms you, but when you elect to *choose* to see Me."

And this is the essential message of Purim. It is about making that sort of choice -- the most significant and joyous choice you will ever make.

#### **Purim Practices**

- 1) We read the Megillah twice, both at night (to celebrate the faith that we found in the midst of darkness) and during the day (to celebrate the fact that our faith was validated openly and joyously).
- 2) We give two kinds of food to at least one friend. This gift is not meant to alleviate need, but rather to create unity. We celebrate being part of a people who lives on miracles.
- 3) We give money to the poor. This spreads the pleasure of feeling cared for, and opens the hearts of both giver and recipient.
- 4) We strengthen our belief in G-d's presence in the real world by having a whopper of a feast. Invite all your friends. Wear a costume to celebrate the fact that things are not always as they seem. Drink until you are so intoxicated that you recognize there are no longer heroes and villains -- just characters in G-d's unending play that reveals His love and presence.

- **1 Adar** (circa 1313 BCE) Plague of Darkness, the ninth plague upon the Egyptians (Exodus 10:23). This started on the 1st of Adar, six weeks before the Exodus.
- 1 Adar [II] (1167/4 CE) Death of the Ibn Ezra
- **2 Adar** (598 BCE) Jerusalem falls to Nebuchadnezzar and Jeconiah is captured.
- 3 Adar (515 BCE) Second Temple completed
- 4 Adar [II] (1992 CE) Death of Menachem Begin
- 7 Adar (1393 BCE) Birth of Moses
- 7 Adar (1273 BCE) Death of Moses
- 7 Adar (1828) Death of Rebbe Isaac Taub of Kalov, founder of the Kalover Hasidic dynasty, and a student of Rabbi Leib Sarah's.
- **9 Adar** (1st century BCE) Academic dissension between Beit Hillel and Beit Shammai, erupted into a violent and destructive conflict over a vote on 18 legal matters leading to the death of 3,000 students. The day was later declared a fast day by the Shulchan Aruch, however, it was never observed as such.
- 13 Adar (474 BCE) War between Jews and their enemies in Persia (Book of Esther, chapter 9).
- **13 Adar** (161 BCE) *Yom Nicanor* The Maccabees defeated Syrian general Nicanor, in a battle fought four years after the Maccabees' liberation of the Holy Land and the miracle of Hanukkah.
- 14 Adar (474 BCE) Purim victory celebrated in the Persian Empire
- 15 Adar (474 BCE) Purim Victory Celebrated in Shushan
- **15** Adar (1st century CE) Jerusalem Gate Day King Agrippa I (circa 21 CE) began construction of a gate for the wall of Jerusalem; the day used to be celebrated as a holiday.
- 17 Adar (522 BCE) Yom Adar the day the Jewish people left Persia following the Purim story.
- 18 Adar [1953] Death of Josef Stalin; brings to a stop the Doctors' Plot
- **20 Adar** (1st century BCE) Choni the Circle Maker prays for rain (Talmud, Taanit 23a)
- 25 Adar (561 BCE) Death of Nebuchadnezzar (Jeremiah 52:31).
- **27 Adar** (561 BCE) Death of Zedekiah in Babylonian captivity. Meroduch, Nebuchadnezzar's son and successor, freed him (and his nephew Jeconiah) on the 27th of Adar, but Zedekiah died that same day.

Celebrate this month of Adar where once more Jews have suffered but were saved from annihilation. That is because The Almighty is always with us Jews.

### FOCUS ON SISTERHOOD



"Remember what Amalek did to you on your journey after you left Egypt. How undeterred by fear of G-d. He surprised you on the march....and cut down all the stragglers in your rear."

This special selection is read from the Maftir on the Shabbat preceding Purim. In our tradition, Haman and all arch enemies of Israel are regarded as spiritual descendants of Amalek. It is the duty of all Jews to remember the Amalek descendants and to be on guard.

Our Sisterhood meeting will be on March 23rd and we will be able to implement, experience and witness some of these observations on Purim as well as the day of our meeting - March 23rd. Today's explanations of the Purim story seem to be an oversimplification and it is and was meant to be so that we can bring this ancient story into our modern lives. As we prepare to celebrate Purim on the 14th of Adar (March 9/10) let us think of ourselves, our actions and reactions to the many Hamans around us today, in our time. Do we feel the love and the loyalty needed to work for life and for liberty for all peoples? Do we give of ourselves, our time, our means? Have we prioritized to put the needs of others on a par with our own? As we drown out the name of Haman, don't allow that noise to overcome your conscience. Just as we give tzedaka to two different people and mishlo'ah manot of sweets and food, we ask you to give yourselves the shalach mones of laughter and joy by your ability to do and to serve.

Our ladies will also delve into some of the psychological meanings of the Purim story as well as such phenomena as a walled city (Jerusalem), etc. We shall then have reports as well as discussion on the following topics: "The Not-So-Secret-Secrets of Purim" and "The Positive Aspects of Laughter" - a science and health discussion.

Finally we will present a funny as well as tremendously emotional discussion about laughter

entitled, "Sometimes Yuck Yuck...Sometimes Not So Much" with a list of characters ranging from Sarah (birth of Isaac), to Victor Frankl - Holocaust survivor, to Gilda Radner, a comedian who fought cancer, to which she eventually succumbed. We see that humor is another kind of protection or healing. It should be no surprise that Jewish humorists' favorite targets are themselves and their fellow Jews. Be Happy It's Adar.

At last we are happy to inform you that this year's Woman of Achievement for our wonderful Torah Fund is Sandi Goodman - a most well deserved honor.

Sandi is a long time member of the Rego Park Jewish Center and presently is the very efficient Recording Secretary of the Board of Trustees. # TIME TO STUDY TORAH & MUSSAR SATURDAY, MARCH 28<sup>th</sup> at 12:30 P.M.

### PARASHAT VAYIKRA

G-d calls to Moses from the Tent of Meeting, and communicates to him the laws of the korbanot, the animal and meal offerings brought in the Sanctuary. These include:

- The "ascending offering" (olah) that is wholly raised to G-d by the fire atop the altar;
- Five varieties of "meal offering" (minchah) prepared with fine flour, olive oil and frankincense;
- The "peace offering" (shelamim), whose meat was eaten by the one bringing the offering, after parts are burned on the altar and parts are given to the kohanim (priests);
- The different types of "sin offering" (chatat) brought to atone for transgressions committed erroneously by the high priest, the entire community, the king or the ordinary Jew;
- The "guilt offering" (asham) brought by one who has misappropriated property of the Sanctuary, who is in doubt as to whether he transgressed a divine prohibition, or who has committed a "betrayal against G-d" by swearing falsely to defraud a fellow man.


